JANUARY

Idaho – Caldwell Night Rodeo (12 – 16 August)

It has been featured on nationwide television and is one of the rodeos listed on the professional rodeo tour. New Mexico – Santa Fe Indian Market (18 – 24 August 2014)

The Santa Fe Indian Market is a 93-year-old Native art market. It is the largest and most prestigious Native arts market in the world and the largest cultural event in the southwest. With over 1,100 Native artists from the U.S. and Canada selling their artwork, the Indian Market attracts 150,000 visitors to Santa Fe from all over the world. From families with young children to avid art collectors, Santa Fe Indian Market attracts international visitors from all walks of life with the opportunity to buy directly from the artists. Minnesota – State Fair (21 August – 1 September)

Nevada – Burning Man Festival (25 August – 1 September)

Once a year, tens of thousands of people from all over the world gather in Nevada's Black Rock Desert to create Black Rock City – a city dedicated to community, art, self-expression, and self-reliance. They depart one week later, having left no trace whatsoever. Described as an experimental community, Burning Man Festival incorporates plenty of partying, impressive fire displays, people donning eye-catching costumes and performing passionate dances until sunrise.
